Community Spotlight: Jean Marie River

Jean Marie River or Ttheke'ehdele (water flowing over clay) is a designaed authority in the Dehcho region. The community is located on the Jean Marie River where it joins the Mackenzie river. The population is around 77 people who speak Dene Zhatie and English. JMR does not have a health centre but has a health station called the "Jean Marie Health Cabin".

In May 2021, the Mackenzie River flooded and caused damage to 22 of the 26 homes as well as to the old school.

The community lost its power source as well. Some of the homes will be replaced this year but some people will stay in camps brought to the community. Keep safe and warm!

JMR is one of our communities in Working Together with Elders. They recently hired a new community facilitator, Jennifer Kraus.

Elder Abuse in NWT

- Most cases of elder abuse are financial in nature.
- Most abuse is done by a family member.
- NWT has a history of intergenerational trauma from colonialism and residential schools.

Most elders do not want to report cases or take legal action

How can I help?

- Talk to the elder in private
- Tell them you are worried about them
- Ask if they are ok
- Ask how you can help
- Listen to and honour what the elder wants

Truth and Reconciliation in the NWT

Sept 30th was the first official National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. We honour the 150,000 Indigenous, Inuit and Metis children and families who were impacted by residential schools across Canada. Children were cut off from their families, language, culture, and traditions in an attempt to strip them of their identity. Although some students had good experiences, many more suffered neglect and abuse. We honour especially the children who died at the residential schools and were not returned home. Many elders in the NWT have shared their stories on a path to healing and reconciliation.
